

The CDIO International Fall Meeting 2021 will be held on-line, in successive sessions in three time zones during two days, November 17-18.

This is a working meeting, and participants will be expected to prepare before actively contributing to the work sessions. Preparatory material will be provided after registration.

Registration opens Monday 18 October

The meetings will take place in the afternoons, 13h00-16h00 local time. The time table below explains the time windows for each session. Each time window in each zone lasts for three hours and covers three topics. Please do not register for multiple time-zones as the number of participants in each time-zone will be limited.

Three topics will be addressed and the outline for the meeting is as follows

- **Introduction: Presentation of work format and expected deliverables**

A short introduction for the meeting, including instructions. (10 Minutes)

The first topic covers two different and related subtopics on the two days.

- **Topic 1: CDIO Peer-to-Peer Review (50 minutes)**

Main responsible: Sarah Junaid and Juha Kontio

Day 1 task: Suggestions for how to establish a cyclic peer-to-peer review for CDIO members that is fit for purpose.

Day 2 task: Suggestions for how to set up a research framework that can be used to build a history of evidence and impact of CDIO in practice.

The first day will focus on generating and harvesting ideas for development, where the European/African session builds upon the outcomes of the Asian/Australian session, and the American session builds upon the outcomes of the European/African session. The second day will be an analytical phase preparing

- **Topic 2: The Future of CDIO (50 minutes)**

Main responsible: Aldert Kamp

Day 1 task: Each regional session produces independently a plausible narrative of the CDIO Initiative, from the regional perspective, with a time horizon of 2040, while reflecting on what has gone wrong or right.

Day 2 task: Each region discusses the overlaps and differences between the three narratives, and comes up with a proposal for sustainable growth of the global CDIO Initiative, again addressing future growth, community organisation and durable engagement.
